

Many of the earlier photographs of Easton have white writing, with very similar handwriting and a slanted T.






Postcards of Franconia, Sugar Hill and Lisbon exist which have similar handwriting and no identification on the backs. The earliest is postmarked 1907.







Below, a postcard from Sugar Hill with the slanted T handwriting and "Plummer Foto System" embossed in the lower right hand corner, postmarked 1909:





Description

A historically important and comprehensive photographic portfolio produced in 1916 by A. W. Plummer Photo News Service of Wallaston Mass., promoting the granite industry in Quincy Adams, Mass. Presented in a ring-bound album featuring 26 large format 9.5×7.5 in. images. Each image is professionally mounted to a single sided 12×9.5 in. canvas backed page; each with captions on the back referring to process where applicable, company featured, persons in the photo, and locations.

Photos include two images of a Titanic Memorial being created in February of 1916. One of these images features the sculptor John Horrigan working on the memorial and is captioned as such. Other images include Steam Drilling at Hitchcock Quarry; Engine used for hoisting granite by the Granite Railway Co.; air drilling at the Swingle Yard; sawing granite at the Milne & Hectre Co.; polishing at the Lincoln Polishing Co.; roughing columns at the Quincy Column Turning Co.; Milne & Chalmers Monumental Yard; Souden & Morrison stone sheds; Birnie & Diack Monumental yard; A.M. Deane & Co. Stone Sheds; Hughes & Johnson Monumentl yard; Loading granite at the A.M. Deane & Co.; Peter Zoia & Co.; John Maravigli & Co.; John R. Richards Monumental yard; Mc Grath Bros. Monumental yard; Teaming granite; West Quincy Railroad Station; and various other processes. An incredible pictorial portfolio of the extensive granite industry in Quincy, Mass."





Article on Isle of Destiny:

"Remember all the shenanigans necessary to issue bonds and build the first Cortez Bridge? Part of the support for the bridge came from a motion picture company at the south end of the island. That movie company was run by Tampa resident Paul Gilmore, who had land holdings on Anna Maria Island.

Tamar Lane, who had a new film-finishing studio in Tampa, said it best. "We will, of course, have quite a lot of materials and persons to take to our studio, and for trucking purposes the bridge will be necessary. There will also be a large number of persons who wish to drive down to the Key to watch the

motion picture in the process of construction. This element (the bridge) will be of benefit to both and I think the citizens of your town realize this and every good influence should be brought to bear on the construction of the bridge."

Paul Gilmore had been a movie actor since 1897, when he played himself in the film "Vanishing Lady" and in "The Miser." He had been on Broadway and formed his own touring company, playing across the South. They had played in Tampa from time to time since 1901. Gilmore had parts in "Rosemary" and in "Penitentes" in 1915, in "Shrine of Happiness" and Raver Film Corporation's "The Other Girl" in 1916. He formerly worked with William "Smiling Bill" Parsons in the National Film Company in Tampa, where he purchased his retirement home. Tampa boosters loved them and bought their stock. Paul Gilmore then opened an acting school.

In 1916, Gilmore parted company with National and sold off some Tampa real estate. He tried Jacksonville, but returned to Bay Shore Boulevard in Tampa. Character Pictures liked his idea for a south sea shipwreck film, "Isle of Destiny." To shoot it they would build a film studio right on Anna Maria Island. Filming would begin in Tampa in April 1920, but they wanted those unspoiled Island views. The best place for that was actually slightly off the Island. Westview, a small island at the southern end of what is today Bradenton Beach, was perfect.


Westview was first surveyed by the U.S. Coast Guard in 1876. In December 1903, Frank H. Palmer of Cortez bought around 30 acres for \$13.43. Well, it was rather soggy around the edges. He subdivided it, platted it in April 1905, and called it Westview. Palmer then sold about 40 lots to Paul Gilmore that acting fellow in December 1925. Gilmore paid \$10 and various other "valuable considerations." A plat filed in 1926 by Gilmore and his wife Pickett called it "Gil-More Subdivision" and it boasted 155 lots after some work had been done. Trust an actor to know how to set a stage!

But at first there was no easy way to the Island. In April 1920, newspapers reported the film-makers had purchased a large studio in Tampa, plus 36 acres of "Oriental Island" at Westview. A larger studio and stage, 125 feet by 125 feet, was to be erected there. The company was asking to rent all of the Island's cottages and the hotel. At the arrival of Gilmore with Albert W. Plummer of the film company, members of the Board of Trade gave them a complimentary dinner at Tampa's Florida Hotel.

Gilmore described plans to build an "Oriental City" on the island and sell lots to motion picture artists. Florida was much closer to New York than California.

The actors, when asked if they preferred to live in Florida or California, always answered "Florida," said Plummer. Of course, he also owned some Westview land and may have skewed the results just a bit.

A letter from Gilmore called for citizens to help them get to the Island. "A bridge we must have in order to come to Bradentown from the Key, as we use thousands of dollars worth of everything that the stores of Bradentown carry. Every day we build a new set for the picture work for that day. Bradentown, with the picture industry located so near, would in a very short time double in size. And all this depends on the bridge, the sooner the industry, which is already 5th largest in the country. I sincerely hope the people of Bradentown will get together." "

Gilmore:

"Gilmore reached full star status in late 1900 with his performance in *The Dawn of Freedom* at the Fourteenth Street Theater in New York City. He performed relentlessly all over the country in scores of plays, often in roles that portrayed him as a swashbuckling lover. Audiences flocked to see him in productions such as *Captain Debonnaire*, *The Mummy and the Hummingbird and The Boys of Company B*.

Gilmore married Mary A. Goodwin in 1901 and was divorced from her in January 1909. In November of that year, he married actress Ethel Elizabeth Cauley, while on tour in Staunton, Virginia.

In addition to operating his own touring stage company and acting in productions throughout the United States, Gilmore began making feature films in 1915. By 1920, he had starred or had major roles in nine movies and accumulated more than \$225,000 in cash and tangible assets, including 40 acres (160,000 m2) of land on Anna Maria Island in Florida. It was here that he hoped to build a movie colony – Paul Gilmore's Oriental Film City – that would rival Hollywood. He and his fourth wife, Pickett Gilmore, were principal officers in the company.

Gilmore and <u>Albert Plummer of Character Pictures</u> began filming the South adventure, *The Isle of Destiny*, in the spring of 1920, on Anna Maria Island. Gilmore pumped huge amounts of his own cash into the production, footing the bill for the importation by boat (there was no serviceable road or bridge to the island) of cars, horses and some 200 actors.

The Isle of Destiny, a six-reeler, performed well when it premiered in New York theaters, and Gilmore planned at least two other films for production on Anna Maria Island. But his speculations in real estate failed, and Gilmore lost all his assets and most of his cash. He returned to New York City, where he settled in Greenwich Villageover a tobacco warehouse that he would transform into the Paul Gilmore Cherry Lane Theatre. Divorced from his fourth wife by the 1930s, he was joined in New York by his daughter, and together they ran the small venue and starred in many of its productions."

330-Mile California Cave System Rediscovered

California Caverns

Across the eastern edge of California, and extending for 300 miles from the southern tip of Nevada, through Death Valley to the Mexican line, there exists a system of giant underground caves, through

which flows a mighty subterranean river, and which, when fully explored, may prove to rival in beauty and extent the world-famed Carlsbad caverns in New Mexico.

That was the opinion expressed today by A.W. Plummer, Hollywood photographer and desert explorer, who, for the first time, exhibited amazing photographs of many of the 14 cavern openings that he has investigated during the past three years.

Cavern System

Plummer said he was not the original discoverer of the caves, for, he declared, many of them were known even to the early Indians. But he claimed to be the first to work on the theory that these numerous holes in the earth's crust, ranging over a wide area, were evidences of a gigantic cavern system and that all of the caves were linked together.

Many of the chambers revealed within the great caverns are 50 feet or more in length and breadth and 30 feet or more in height. From their ceilings hand glistening stalactites similar to those of the Carlsbad caves, Plummer said.

Far down in the black and hidden recesses, and in some place can even be seen, rushing water, giving evidence of the underground river.

Fresh Winds

Great winds blow up from the cavern depths -- fresh winds, which like the presence of the running water, indicates to Plummer, he says, that the many caverns are linked one with the other in a huge cave system.

Plummer said he first heard of the news from Indians who had a legend that great windstorms that visited the desert blew up from the depths of the hidden chasms. For a year, he said, he hunted for these "wind holes", finally coming upon one of them on a limestone butte on the desert floor.

With the aid of a helper he slid through a hole the size of a barrel-top to a point 10 feet below where the cave narrowed abruptly. At the end of a rope, he lowered himself through the narrow slit a distance of 65 feet to a ledge.

First Of Caves

There, through aperatures too small to permit his passage, he beheld the first of the large stalactite-hung rooms.

Since then, Plummer says he has found 14 different openings, strung ouit over 300 miles in a jagged and twisting line. The largest openings he has found closer to the Mexican border. Each opening leads to huge rooms or chambers at greater depths.

Plummer's theory of the caves is that in early geologic periods there was a gigantic upheaval that caused the buckling of the earth's crust along the approximate line of the cavern openings he has found.

Water was allowed to penetrate to great depths by the broken aperative thus caused, combining with chemical deposits and causing great geysers.

Cavern Openings

These Plummer believes are the cavern openings found today.

Later water seepage caused to river which he believes is flowing deep under the ground and the river, it is his opinion, carried away great masses of sediment, allowing the caves to be formed.
