REPORT OF SCHOOL BOARD.

Text Books Authorized by School Board,

Readers, Lippincott's. Speller, Patterson's Common School. Grammar, Tweed's Common School. Arithmetic, Greenleaf's Inductive. Geography, Harper's. Copy Book, Harper's. History, Barnes'. Physiology, Smith's. As these are satisfactory there is no change contemplated at present.

ROLL OF PERFECT ATTENDANCE,

Including the names of all pupils who have been present every half-day of a term without being tardy.

School No. 1. First term—Harold Aldrich, Fred E. Tague, Willie G. Tague, Eugene F. Tague, Eva S. Aldrich, Edna E. Ball, Nellie O. Noyes. Second term—Harry F. Noyes.

School No. 2. First term—Edua Brown, Frank Jones, Ida Hall. Second term—Viola M. Lane.

School No. 3. Frst term—Bertha Whitcomb, Edith Gordon. Second term—Jessie Noyes, Horace Stevens.

In No. 1 we have had 26 weeks of school and the average attendance was very good. Miss Evelyn A. Wells had charge the first term, Mrs. Helen M. Smalley the second, both experienced and successful teachers. At the close of each term the pupils did themselves and their teachers credit.

In No. 2 the first term was taught by Mrs. A. T. Young, who had taught a number of terms in this school before and always with excellent success.

The second term Miss Luella M. Huse had charge and did good work, sparing no pains on her part to make this a profitable term. The parents in this school could help if they would see that their children attend school more regularly.

No. 3. This school had two terms, 26 weeks in all, Miss Grace Webster was employed as teacher each term and was well liked by parents and scholars.

Our schools all celebrated Columbus Day and although it was a rainy day most of the parents attended and the exercises were enjoyed by all.

The amount of school money was \$461.25, and of this \$442 has been expended, leaving \$19.25 unexpended. Hoping that the interest of the past year will be continued and our schools still improve,
