School Board.

In the statistical report you will find the number of schools we have maintained, the number of weeks in each term, and the names of the teachers.

I am constrained to speak of the irregularity of attendance in some of our schools, for it is a glaring evil. The truant law is good as a last resort, but if we wish to accomplish permanent good, it must be through an awakened conscience; for we all know that the Republic rests upon the corner stone of general intelligence, and that self-preservation is the duty of the government as well as of individuals. On this theory the state has passed laws requiring a certain amount of attendance at school yearly from every child between five and fifteen years of age.

It would be supposed that all would agree that children should be defended against the greed and selfishness of parents or employers. But the law will not correct all the errors without help; and until every citizen shall interest himeelf deeply in the purpose and idea of the public school, and shall be found giving a portion of his time to the advancement of education, we need not expect to see the high standard of living and thinking which is not only the duty, but the privilege of every American.

It is the duty of parents to look well to the education of their children, therefore let us unite and do all we can for their advancement.
