Statement of School Treasurer

By virtue of a change in the State law, relative thereto, the financial year of school districts, which has formerly ended on February 15, now ends August 31. This is to make the closing of the fiscal year coincident with the closing of the school year proper, which has ended on August 31 for some years past. Hence the report which has formerly been made by the school treasurer on February 15 is not due until after August 31, and will probably be printed with the town reports for next year.

This is in accordance with the recommendation of the New Hampshire Department of Public Instruction. It is, however, suggested that a statement of the financial condition of the District be made by the treasurer at the annual school meeting. Inasmuch as, by this method of announcement, only a few of those interested would hear the report, there follows a brief statement of the finances of the District on January 31, 1918:
