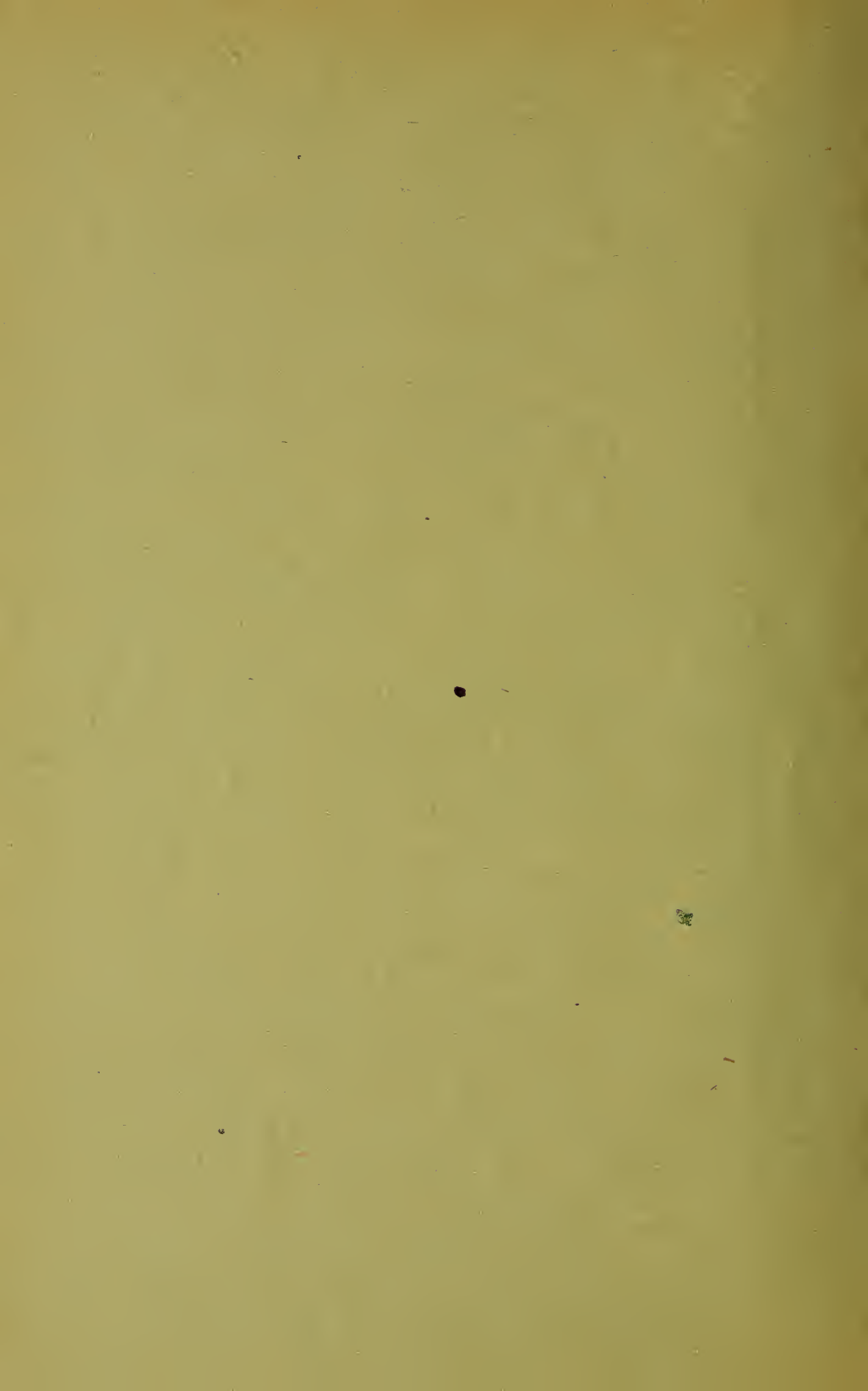

There is not much to say about our library. Though the money appropriated is small it is used for books, so that we get more, according to our expenses, than the larger towns. We have some of the best books, to be had, and people enjoy reading them.

School Report

FOR THE YEAR ENDING FEBRUARY 1, 1922.

Our last school report left off with Mrs. Roscoe Young teaching in No. 1 school house; and bringing the children from the No. 2 neighborhood. Mrs. Young finished the winter term of ten weeks at \$15.00 a week. We expected she would finish the school year, but circumstances developed that made it impossible for her to do so. At that time of year it was hard to get teachers. We had Winifred Dexter, of Landaff one week at \$17.00. Miss Doris Hildreth, from Plymouth Normal, for four weeks, at \$17.00 a week. She was well liked, and would have been glad to keep her; but she was obliged to return to Plymouth to prepare for graduation. Then we hired Mrs. Frances Hibbard, of Sugar Hill seven weeks at \$18.00 a week. That made twelve weeks for the spring term; finishing the thirty six weeks for the school year. The teachers all took care of their board, and transportation. We paid Roscoe Young \$8.00 a week for bringing the pupils from the No. 2 school; with the stipulation that some grown up members of the family should go with the team.

When the spring term ended we had left, between the old post office and the Franconia line, only Ethel Pease and Durand Cooley, who intended to continue school. Ethel Pease had been in Dow Academy one year, and Durand Cooley in Sugar Hill school; so it was voted in school meeting to transfer the school to No. 2. A hardwood floor was laid and the new desks moved from No. 1. Miss Winifred Perkins, of Fran-*Klin*

onia, was engaged as teacher, at \$20.00 a week. She is an experienced teacher, and holds a state certificate. There have been added new window shades and new blackboards. The scholars are pleased with the change, and there has been no transportation to pay, expect \$36.00 for Durand Cooley. That is all there will be for him. There were two small boys in Wildwood who moved there last summer. They were only six and eight years old, and just beginning so we hired Mrs. Perley Farrington to teach them. They are gone now, to Vermont; but they have made a beginning, Mrs. Farrington was paid \$5.00 per week. The children did well and their parents were pleased with the arrangement.
