March 8, 1932.

Article 1. To choose all necessary town officers for the year ensuing.

Article 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations for same.

Article 3. To see if the town will vote to accept State Aid and raise necessary money for same.

Article 4. To see if the town will vote to accept State Aid on two new cement bridges and raise necessary money for same.

Article 5. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate money to eradicate pine blister rust.

Article 6. To see if the town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to allow a discount of 2% on early payment of taxes.

Article 7. To see if the town will vote to have its highways plowed in winter.

Article 8. To see if the town will vote sufficient appropriations for observance of Old Home Day and for appointments of proper committee of arrangements.

Article 9. To hear the reports of committees and agents and to transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

LIBRARY REPORT

This has been a most satisfactory year for the library, and we feel that each year its usefulness increases. The total number of books loaned during the year was 651. Of these 225 were non-fiction, including history, biography, poetry, and the various sciences, 150 were children's books, and the balance adult fiction.

A large map of the New England States, with an additional map of the paved roads of the United States, were purchased for the library. These contain a great deal of valuable information, and we feel will prove very useful.

A State Aid Fund has been established to assist libraries that have only a small sum of money to spend annually. From this Fund a gift of 25 books was sent to us, by the Public Library Commission. These include two volumes of poetry, two of science, five auto-biographies, and sixteen of fiction. We deeply appreciate this splendid gift.

Mrs. Annie H. Bowles, of Lexington, Mass., who is ever mindful of the needs of the library, sent us five volumes of fine fiction. The gift and the thoughtfulness are much appreciated.

The library now contains 1,205 volumes; the value is estimated at \$1,500.00 or more, but the service to the community cannot be calculated in terms of dollars and cents. As money spent for schools is money well spent, giving rich returns, so money spent for

libraries is well invested, giving most valuable returns to the community.

Books are borrowed very extensively by the teacher and pupils of our district school, and also by our high school students attending Dow Academy in Franconia. These students use the library almost every day. Students from other towns also come to borrow books that are not in the libraries of their own towns. We gladly give every possible aid to all students.

An interesting trustees' meeting was recently held in which trustees and librarian were in perfect agreement on library policies.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

The total enrollment last year was 18 with an average membership of 17.9. The percent of attendance was 94.76 and the number of tardinesses 12. This was a good record. The enrollment this year is 23.

Miss Barbara Holmes of Gorham, N. H., a graduate of Plymouth Normal School in 1931, took the place of Mrs. Hazel Goodwin as teacher.

For the past two years the school district has appropriated only \$1,500.00 for school purposes. In 1929-30 \$2,084.25 was spent and in 1930-31 \$1,897.79 was expended. A large balance from the previous year prevented a deficit at the end of 1929-30. At the end of 1930-31 there was a deficit of \$89.24. This year there will be an estimated deficit of about \$250.00. Several items in next year's budget had to be increased. Transportation is now costing over \$200.00 per year. The school house roof needs shingling on the north side and the administration expense will be large due to the printing of an itemized report of expenditures. In order to pay the deficit and run your school with any degree of efficiency it seems absolutely necessary for the School Board to ask for an appropriation of \$2,000.00 for next year.
