

TOWN MEETING WARRANT

Article 1. To choose all necessary officers for the ensuing year, with the exception of auditor.

Article 2. To see if the town will vote to have the annual town books and records examined, audited and certified by an outside auditor or public accountant hired by the selectmen, or to continue the appointment of an individual as auditor chosen at the annual town meeting.

Article 3. To see if the town will vote to accept Town Road Aid: Town's Share \$28.59; State's Share \$190.57; and raise money for same.

Article 4. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$28.98 to the White Mountains Region Association, being 10¢ per \$1,000 of assessed valuation (1/100th of 1%) for the purpose of issuing and distributing printed matter and advertising and otherwise publicizing the advantages of the Town, in cooperation with the other 45 towns of the region.

Article 5. To see if the town will vote to accept State Aid Construction: Town's Share—\$435.00; State's Share—\$1,000.00, and raise money for same.

Article 6. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to post an appropriate notice at the Town Hall or elsewhere, for the purpose of prohibiting the establishment of any automobile junk, scrap or storage areas on property facing, joining or abutting any of the principal, designated roads of the town.

Article 7. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$125.00 for the town library.

Article 8. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$75.00 for the cemetery.

Article 9. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to hire money for defraying town charges in anticipation of taxes, if necessary.

Article 10. To see if the town will instruct the selectmen to allow discount for early payment of taxes. What per cent, and at what time?

Article 11. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as are stated in the proposed budget for repair to town highways and bridges, general expense of highways, snow removal, maintenance of town building, officers' salaries and expenses, and other town charges.

Article 12. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

FOREST FIRE PREVENTION IS EVERYBODY'S BUSINESS

Carelessness is responsible for 97 percent of all our forest fires. This is a serious indictment of our interest in our own welfare and that of our neighbors. In too many instances this carelessness results in the destruction, not of the careless one's own property, but of someone not even known to him.

Thoughtlessly thrown lighted cigars, cigarettes and matches from moving vehicles, by hikers, hunters and fishermen; the careless burning of debris during hazardous periods, high winds or in dangerous locations; improperly extinguished camp or cook fires — all add up to the CARELESSNESS that means serious loss of property, disruption of industry and farm work and unnecessary expenditures of town and state funds.

It points to the need of eliminating CARELESSNESS so far as it concerns fire from our daily life. The rules are simple — your cooperation is earnestly solicited.

1. Be careful with fire in or near woodlands.
2. Be sure that all lighted material — cigars, cigarettes and matches — is completely out before discarding it. Use ash trays in autos.
3. Secure the required written permission to burn from your local forest fire warden when the ground is not completely covered with snow.
4. Insist that others be careful and comply with burning requirements.
5. Call the warden promptly when fire is detected and aid him to extinguish it.

Let's remember that FOREST FIRE PREVENTION is EVERYBODY'S BUSINESS and our MOST IMPORTANT undertaking!

SCHOOL WARRANT

To the Inhabitants of the School District in the Town of Easton, New Hampshire, qualified to vote in District affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said District on the ninth day of March, 1955, at 7:30 o'clock in the afternoon to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agents of the District.
6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
8. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application

against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state foundation aid fund together with other income; the School Board to certify to the Selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

9. To see if the District wishes to submit its transportation to bids.
10. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the School Board and Citizens of Easton:

I herewith submit my twelfth annual report as Superintendent of Schools.

There were 14 pupils attending school last year. Six elementary pupils enrolled in the Franconia Elementary School, and 8 were enrolled in the High School, better known as Dow Academy.

There are 7 pupils attending school this year — four in the elementary school and three in the high school. They are as follows: Dale Bowles, Grade 2; Bernice Cooley, Grade 6; Ingrid Schultze, Grade 6; Lois Bowles, Grade 7; Alice Cooley, Grade 9; Peter Bowles and Eleanor Cooley, Grade 11.

The seven pupils who have apparently left school are still enrolled at Dow Academy but now live in Franconia and Lisbon Town.

Your school census this year showed 4 pre-school children, 7 in school and 1 under eighteen out of school. Last year there were 3 pre-school children, 14 in school and 4 under eighteen out of school.

Recent graduates of Dow Academy from Easton are:

Katherine Cooley, employed at the Tramway;
Roger Glover, employed at Vintinner's Filling Station; Patricia Leighton, employed at New England Telephone and Telegraph Company;
George Whitcomb, employed at home; Evelyn Wolff, attending Simmons College.

A report of the work at Dow Academy is included in this report.

I wish to thank the school officers and members of the community for their continued cooperation and support.

REPORT OF THE PRINCIPAL

The fourth annual report of the present administration of Dow Academy is hereby submitted.

FACULTY

The fall term began with the following teachers several of whom were staff members last year: Mrs. Alice Leavitt, Mr. Oliver Cole, Jr., Mr. Ernest Morin, and myself. Five teachers new to our system were contracted to fill the gap left by those who did not return for this school year. Miss Helen Bridgeo, a graduate of Plymouth Teachers' College, is teaching grades three and four. Mrs. Janice Darling, also a Plymouth Teachers' College graduate, is teaching the Commercial studies. Mrs. Jane Evans, of Lisbon and Keene, is teaching Home Economics for grades seven and eight and also vocal music for all grades. Miss Nancy Klingensmith, who formerly taught at Monroe, is teaching grades five and six. Miss Janet Stewart, another recent graduate of Plymouth Teachers' College, is teaching English and French. Franconia is fortunate in this day of great teacher shortages to have such a capable faculty. It is a pleasure to work with them. They are conscientious, serious, and eager to do their best for your children.

CURRICULUM

The shop has been moved from the gymnasium to the small building to the east of the gym. Much of the work done in preparing the building for use was supplied by the shop students. This new set-up has afforded us more room and much better area for work. We feel that the results are well worth the trouble of moving. Junior and Senior boys are now able to take shop courses. This year Practical Electricity and Auto Mechanics are being offered. Shop courses are

offered to all grades in the high school and we are operating on an eight period day. Each period is forty-five minutes in length. All classes meet five periods per week. The exceptions are in shop courses, commercial courses (Stenography and Typing), and scientific courses (Biology and Chemistry). The above courses meet either seven or ten periods per week.

ACTIVITIES

The organization of the ski program has been changed. The ski lessons offered are sponsored and supported by the school alone. The Franconia Junior Ski Club through the Roland Peabody Memorial Fund provides equipment for those who do not have it. The entire program is under the capable supervision of Oliver Cole, Jr.

The band is under the direction of Mr. George McLure. This year the band rehearses with Bethlehem and with Lincoln on an alternating week basis. Mrs. Evans directs the Glee Club. One concert has been given and others are planned for the rest of the year.

Dow was one of the first schools to participate in the Firearms Safety Program. This program was sponsored by the State Department of Education. Mr. Cole directed the instruction. The results should prove very beneficial.

The Dramatics Club, directed by Miss Stewart, presented one very successful play and another will be presented in the spring. A public speaking contest for grades seven and eight was held this fall. A contest for the upper grades is planned for the spring.

The Student Council is working on a plan for the awarding of sweaters for those students who will have earned enough points during their school years. These points would be based on all types of activities.

A school newspaper is once again being published by the students. One issue has already come off the

press and further issues are being planned. Mrs. Darling is in charge of this activity.

The elementary teachers and pupils provided a fine Christmas program for the school. The elementary division of the school is bustling with industrious activity and accomplishment. These teachers are doing a fine job, teaching the fundamentals and background materials to their students.

Under the co-sponsorship of the Trustees and the Dow Academy P. T. A., dancing lessons were given interested students by Mrs. Ross of St. Johnsbury, Vermont. Many students participated and many social benefits are gained.

ATHLETICS

The following athletic program is offered at the school this year:

Fall baseball directed by Mr. Cole. Boys basketball directed by Mr. Shores. Girls basketball direct by Miss Stewart and Mrs. Darling. Junior and Senior Ski teams directed by Mr. Cole. Baseball directed by Mr. Cole. Softball directed by Miss Stewart.

HEALTH

Physicial examinations were held as usual for grades 4, 8, and 11. All children were also given the opportunity to have a complete physical examination. Dr. Parker conducted these with the assistance of Miss Simeneau. Eye and ear tests have also been conducted by Miss Simeneau. The Dental Clinic is in operation and grades 2 and 5 are the first to take advantage of this worthwhile program. We hope that this will be the beginning of a better and more expanded dental health program.

SCHOOL LUNCH

We were fortunate to find two ladies to replace Mrs. Lena Shores as operator of the lunch program. Mrs. Harry Aldrich and Mrs. Edgar Dexter have done a fine

job continuing this valuable program. It is our hope that the near future will see a lunch program located here at the school which will offer hot lunches during the full school year.

GENERAL ADMINISTRATION

Mid-term reports are sent home again this year to all parents of children in grades 7-12. It is our hope that these, plus report cards, will keep parents closely informed of their children's progress at school. Parents and visitors are welcome to visit their school in operation. We are expanding our guidance materials in an effort to better guide the students in school activities and in their future goals in life. Parental cooperation in the home is of the greatest value.

We are also setting up a program whereby we can locate and improve the reading difficulties and skills of the students. This is a long term project and will require hard work by the whole faculty.

We are again indebted to the Trustees for their generous assistance in providing funds for many useful projects at school. Personal contributions by individual Trustees are also gratefully appreciated.

It was a sincere loss to the school and students when our beloved bus driver, Perry Ball, passed away. His friendliness, thoughtfulness, and understanding of the students will always be remembered and appreciated. The new arrangement for school transportation is working efficiently and satisfactorily.

This year is proving to be a very happy one. It is my feeling that the school is operating smoothly and much is being accomplished in the way of desirable educational goals. It is my firm conviction that much credit should go to your conscientious School Board and to your capable and understanding Superintendent.
